1 Imagine Peace's mission statement

The "Imagine Peace" project aims to foster a sense of unity and connection among five different European light festivals that take place in different European cities: Brixen (Italy), Copenhagen (Denmark), Essen (Germany), Oslo (Norway) and Pula (Croatia). By combining artistic expression with a transnational approach, sustainable practices, and a focus on a better future, the project showcases Europe's cultural diversity and inspires more sustainable festival practices. It creates a network of connections among the festivals, encouraging collaboration and mutual inspiration.

Shared themes, methods, and the inclusion of a Ukrainian artist unify the festivals and promote a sense of community across borders. The theme of peace transcends cultural boundaries, emphasising shared values and collective aspirations for a harmonious world. This project surpasses the traditional limits of individual festivals, creating a unified and connected celebration of light, art, and sustainability across Europe. By integrating diverse cultural elements and focusing on "IMAGINE PEACE," the project not only strengthens the European dimension but also contributes to a shared vision for a harmonious and sustainable future.

2 Participating Light Festivals

2.1Brixen Water Light Festival

Local and international artists transform fountains and cultural-historical treasures into an open-air gallery with their creative ideas. Reflections on ecological, economic and social aspects related to water and light are the basis of the artistic works. Under the motto "Water is life - light is art", an art trail is being created in Brixen's old town. The Brixen Water Light Festival takes place every two years in May. The idea for the festival was born in 2015 after the premiere of the light and music show at the Hofburg in Brixen. The first edition of the festival was held in May 2017.

2.2 Copenhagen Light Festival

Since 2017, Copenhagen Light Festival has brought light to the darkest months of the year. Each February, the city is transformed by atmospheric and visually engaging experiences that offer new perspectives on urban life. For three weeks, Copenhagen becomes a large-scale outdoor exhibition of light art and installations in all shapes and sizes — from monumental works that light up the night sky to poetic, interactive pieces that invite close exploration. The majority of the light works are placed along a path in the inner city and the harbour, while a selection of art works that can be experienced in areas located outside of the city centre.

2.3 Essen Light Festival

The Essen Light Festival is an annual celebration that transforms the city of Essen into a luminous art gallery. Scheduled for its 10th anniversary from 2 to 12 October 2025, the festival will feature a compact 2-kilometre route through the city centre, showcasing 16 venues with spectacular light shows, video mappings,

projections, and diverse installations by national and international artists. Highlights from previous editions include "Big Picture" on Kennedyplatz, where the entire square becomes a canvas for projections of artworks from the Museum Folkwang, creating an immersive experience for visitors. Other notable installations have featured interactive elements, such as "On Air" at Radio Essen, allowing attendees to engage directly with the light art. The festival is free to attend and offers a unique opportunity to experience the magic of light art in an urban setting.

2.4 Fjord Oslo

Fjord Oslo is a free light art festival that transforms the Harbour Promenade in central Oslo into a large-scale outdoor exhibition of light. By taking art onto the streets for four nights, the festival invites to a social, powerful and inclusive experience of art and light. The festival features an international programme of renowned artists, showcasing a broad exploration of light art. From projections onto landmark buildings to intimate installations, site-specific light sculptures, and immersive video work, the festival offers diverse experiences for visitors. Fjord Oslo aims to create a positive, inclusive, social, and open cultural event for everyone in the city of Oslo, bringing people and art into the streets during the dark time of the year.

2.5 Visualia Festival of Light Pula

The Visualia Festival of Light in Pula, Croatia, is an annual celebration that transforms the city's historic streets and landmarks into a vibrant canvas of light and art. One of the festival's iconic features is the "Lighting Giants"—illuminated cranes of the Uljanik Shipyard that have become a symbol of Pula's modern identity. The event also includes unique attractions like the recreational night race "Xica," adding a dynamic element to the festivities. Marko Bolkovic - Visualia Light Festival Pula

Marko Bolković brings extensive experience in electronics, audio engineering, and light design, with a strong focus on 3D mapping and interactive installations. As founder, director, and curator of *Visualia Festival*, he has led numerous light festivals and creative projects, showcasing both artistic and technical expertise. In this project, Marko oversees artistic direction, technical execution, and the creation of transitional artworks that promote engagement and sustainability. As Artistic Director of *Visualia Group*, he leads a collective specialising in 3D mapping, light installations, and participatory art. His leadership fosters innovation and inclusion, making the group a key contributor to the project's creative vision. Marko's commitment to sustainable cultural development and strategic support for municipalities further reinforces the long-term impact and relevance of the initiative.

Nikolina Vuković - Visualia Light Festival Pula

Eva Esmann Behrens - Denmark

Eva Esmann Behrens is a visual artist based in Aarhus, Denmark. In her works with projection art, she is inspired by a formal background in dance and history of ideas together with her visual artistic development. It is a value for Eva, that the material that she uses is often either made by hand, found in nature or in other ways has it outspring in the real world and is tangible. Eva has presented her works on large and small stages, in city spaces and towns. She has presented her works at Copenhagen Light festival, Kunstmuseum Bonn and with The Symphonic Orchestra in Aarhus. Alessandro Lupi - Italy

Alessandro Lupi's research has developed over the years by working on a strong experimentation on matter, light and shadow. Each work is an invention and investigates in a different way the way we perceive reality, each time trying to start from space and dialoguing with it. His installations are perceptual, poetic and immersive experiments in which the public can participate, relate and reflect.

Claudia Reh - Germany

Claudia Reh, graduate landscape architect (TU Dresden), is a light artist and documentary filmmaker. Since 2006, she has been working with overhead projectors on light installations and live paintings in public spaces under the label 'Echtzeitlicht'. She has participated in international festivals in Ghent, Amsterdam, Vilnius and Pula, among others. She develops light performances for theatre and completed a degree in directing at the filmArche Berlin in 2017. Reh lives with her daughter in Dresden.

Petar Šćulac - Croatia

Petar Šćulac (b. 1980, Pula) is a visual artist whose work includes painting, illustration, restoration, scenography, and visual installations. Since 2012, he has been actively exhibiting at art festivals and exhibitions. His recent focus is on light installations that explore the dynamic relationship between light, shadow, and space. By blending traditional techniques with experimental media, he creates immersive environments that challenge perception and evoke introspection. His work often investigates how light transforms spatial narratives and alters the viewer's emotional and sensory experience.

Julia Shamsheieva – Ukraine

Julia Shamsheieva is a Ukrainian artist who creates vivid and captivating 3D and motion art pieces, allowing her creativity to run wild. With a Bachelor of Arts and as a member of the Union of Designers in Ukraine, she works with video mapping, digital art, light installations, and AR & VR. Her dedication has earned her the Grand Prize at the Circle of Light, 1minute Projection Mapping, Imapp and Schlosslichtspiele Karlsruhe festivals. Julia's works appear at global festivals, where she highlights the cultural and natural elements of each location. Her main aim is to let light tell stories and expand perception through new contexts.

VOID – Norway

Void is a multidisciplinary studio operating at the intersection of design, architecture, art, and technology. The interdisciplinary team holds specialist expertise in architecture, product development, light, form, programming, and advanced computational design. Void delivers innovative interactive installations for a range of contexts—ranging from architectural ornamentation in office buildings and public environments to exhibitions for museums and artists across various disciplines, both indoors and outdoors.
